Hillcrest Farm Homeowners,

On behalf of the board members, thank you for your response to the recent survey regarding the possibility of exploring a pool. We had a <u>tremendous response</u> from homeowners which was helpful in the evaluation process.

The board made a decision to communicate via our letter last month and ask for your input in order to achieve the following objectives:

- 1. Ensure communication went to the entire neighborhood, there are several that are not participating in social media and this ensures communication to all homeowners.
- 2. Communicate the decision to incorporate the new homes into the Hillcrest Farm neighborhood. The board went through a Q and A process before making this decision. The current board is aware that previous board members did several years ago when adding new phases to the neighborhood and went through a similar process to make decisions on adding additional homes to the neighborhood.
- 3. The board was approached by homeowners to re-consider the pool concept/idea based on the fact that land/lots would be available. It is important to note that this request was not driven by board members. The board did determine that we needed more input for home owners. In order to best achieve this objective with as little cost as possible, this is why we decided to ask for your input via the survey.

Based on the survey results, the board has <u>decided to not move forward</u> with exploring the pool options. There are several factors that were used in making this decision and we want the survey results to be transparent and visible to the entire neighborhood. These results and comments are posted on our HOA webpage to allow for your review if desired.


Our neighborhood bylaws and declarations < legal documents > have not changed and these also can be found via our HOA webpage. In order to finance a pool, we would need to change our legal documents which requires a large majority of total homeowners to vote yes. Based on the responses received from the survey and assuming a similar run rate for those that have not responded, it would be very difficult to getting any amendments passed for financing.

Should you have additional questions or comments for the board, we would ask that you please direct these to our management company (blaine@cmckc.com) so they can be addressed with the board via e-mail or via our monthly agenda. Homeowners are welcome to attend the monthly meetings and are generally held on the 2nd Monday of the month. We would encourage you to check the HOA webpage as there are times we do move the meeting based on scheduling conflicts.

The board understands this is a topic that has supporters that are for and against the idea of a pool. We know there is passion on both sides. Again, we sincerely appreciate the responses and comments as this allowed for us to hear from a majority of homeowners in order to best make decisions.



Q1 Based on the inserted map of the proposed new homes in the final phase of Hillcrest farm likely to be built, would you support a pool and parking area to be built in this area?






